Tifini has been a teacher, a social worker and a professional hair and make up artist (well known and successful). She had a blog and, with a partner, founded a lifestyle magazine and became a member of the New York Association of Black Journalists. She has three children and had a home of her own.

Then things darkened as she slipped into a jarring foreclosure. She left her home and traveled to Houston, finding work as a substitute teacher. The loneliness, extreme depression and shame of her circumstances intensified her drinking. She knew she was approaching addiction with her alcohol abuse and needed support.

Another eviction leveled her and left her alone with two children in a strange city.

A friend told her about Santa Maria, and she applied for housing in our transitional apartments for women and children who are homeless. She was on the waiting list for four months, but she was persistent. She was finally accepted in February 2015.

Once safe in her new surroundings, her case manager, Erin Martin, recognized that there were issues with alcohol, and Tifini needed treatment. It was actually a big relief because she knew that she needed treatment. Here, she could be in treatment and have her children with her! She was switched to the Women with Children program and spent 120 days in treatment. Later she completed the outpatient phase while training for work.

Another staff member, Senior Director Donna White, saw something special in Tifini. She was recommended for a culinary training program through the Houston Food Bank and SER Jobs for Progress, a collaboration arranged by Educational Services Instructor, Linda Johnson. She would be the first client from SMH to be given this opportunity. She continued as an intern at Le Meridien, serving her time in the kitchen preparing meals for employees of the hotel. She loved cooking and the ability to create.

Through grace, she has found friends, hope, church and community. Erin and Donna have served as mentors to this productive young woman. Her children have thrived along with her and many times encouraged her to go on. One day, one moment at a time and a lot of hard work have proven that life doesn't end because of mishaps. She is the face and voice of **RecovHERy** as well as a proud member of the recovery movement. Your continued support has allowed Tiffini the time and security to build a better future.

EDUCATIONAL AND CAREER DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

Linda Johnson's biggest joy is motivating her students to do something extra for their lives! As the Educational Services Instructor of SMH, she facilitates and maintains curricula for GED, Life Skills and Career Development classes for those clients who are actively engaged in our treatment programs. She also develops and maintains collaborative partnerships within the community, related agencies and businesses that can enhance or support her programs.

Originally from Louisiana, Linda moved to Houston after her college years. She entered the corporate life as a business analyst. In 2004, she found Bonita

House as a volunteer and made teaching her mission and her purpose, coming on board as a staff member to share her gift for teaching.

In her time at SMH, she has helped hundreds of women start the process of obtaining their GED. Thirty women have completed their GED certifications with her guidance. She shares their achievements through exciting group announcements and a special graduation celebration, presenting the graduate to her peers and family at our monthly Recovery Recognition events. She also teaches Life Skills and Career Development classes that teach and improve job readiness skills and strategies. These classes inspire better paying jobs, careers or support higher educational learning skills or training.

She sparks action through exploration and discovery, insisting that her students open the door to their future. She teaches them not to put a ceiling on where they want to be, but rather take full advantage of all the opportunities offered to them during their stay at Santa Maria.

AN INSPIRING PARTNERSHIP



On December 12, 13 students from the University of Houston Downtown, College of Public Service, received their Recovery Coach Diploma from Amelia Murphy, Senior Director of Recovery Support Services (RSS) at Santa Maria. To date, 35 students have received the valuable training from the RSS staff of Santa Maria. During this event, students celebrated the culmination of the Senior Seminar in Criminal Justice imparted by Assistant Professor Dr. Judith Harris. In acknowledgment to Ms. Murphy's work with the students, Dr. Harris said "UHD is so proud to have you as an integral partner in our ongoing guest for student awareness in the area of substance abuse and reentry." The evening's special guest speakers were Nadine Scamp, CEO of Santa Maria and Texas Senator John Whitmire.

Whitmire led the tone with his remarks. "Mental health is driving the criminal justice system as I stand here talking to you." He cited a study done a few years ago, where 32,000 of the 150,000 individuals incarcerated in Texas had participated in a mental health program before they ended up in the criminal justice system. "That is a sin that we as Texans should not be proud of. Approximately 32,000 people are locked up tonight in prison, because they could not get the right mental health, counseling and

medication they needed," he said.

He highlighted the creation of the BAMBI Program, a partnership between Texas Department of Criminal Justice and Santa Maria that began eight years ago as an example of a solution. He challenged us all to do more. "Using common sense and compassion we can do better."

On a similar note, Nadine Scamp, CEO of Santa Maria mentioned, "Through programs that re-emphasize rehabilitation, strong family and community engagement we can help reduce the incarceration rate and improve the health and safety of the entire community."

Ms. Scamp spoke to the students and gave a compelling message about how they can help impact the problem with their empathy. "Please remember that the person standing before you is more than just the crime they've committed. They have a name, not just a number. They are individuals who have unique history, strengths and challenges. The individual before you, does not have to be defined by their past. He or she has the opportunity for a new chance to successfully reenter society and be a productive contributing member. But often it takes all of us working together to make that success happen."
